Course Title: Criminal Law

Course Abbreviation and Number: CRI 2530

Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Course includes an analysis of the origin and general principles of criminal law. Incorporates substantive criminal law with emphasis on the elements of each crime and the proof required to prosecute or defend the crime charged. Students are required to apply various judicial decisions to appropriate class discussions.

Prerequisite: ENG 1510, CRI 1510.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students who demonstrate understanding can:

1. Explain the elements of a crime;
 2. Apply the general principles of Criminal Law to specific elements of certain crimes;
 3. List and describe the constitutional limitations on Criminal Law;
 4. Differentiate between excuses and justifications in Criminal Law.

 - Offenses against public morality
 - Offenses against public order and safety and Criminal responsibility and Defenses.
