Course Title: The American Civil War

Course Abbreviation and Number: HIS 2100 Credit Hours: 3 Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Students will survey the American Civil War and the subsequent Reconstruction Era. The specific topics to be covered include the causes of the war; the political, economic, military, and diplomatic execution of the war; the problem of waging war in a democracy; the constitutional issues raised by the war; the reasons the South lost the Civil War; the impact of the war and reconstruction on American history; and the reconstruction policies of Lincoln, Johnson, and the Radical Republicans. Lectures will focus on the military aspects of the war.

Prerequisite/Corequisite: ENG 1530.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students who demonstrate understanding can:

- 1. Identify and explain the historical significance of important events, actions, individuals, and other concepts, in relation to the Civil War.
- 2. Identify and critically analyze the arguments and evidence used by various authors to support their theories, including the various theories of causation encountered in assigned texts.
- 3. Write coherent and chronologically accurate narratives that not only describe what happened, but also explain why it may have happened.
